Students Presenting Psychiatric Aspects of Medicine (SPPAM)

- Students are placed in 3 groups. Each group will be assigned to a Monday or Tuesday afternoon timeslot. Presentations are all over Zoom.
- Length: 1.5 hours weekly on weeks 2, 3, 4, 5
- Grading: 25 points, 6.94% of the total grade
- Attendance is mandatory, it will be taken. Students must attend all presentations with their cameras on.
- Overview: An opportunity for students to research and present on a psychiatry-related topic of their choosing. Students are encouraged to dive into a topic that interests them. The topic can reflect a theme within psychiatry or one that overlaps with another specialty. Creative topics and presentations are encouraged.

Objectives

The student will demonstrate the ability to...

- Learn about, and teach, aspects of psychiatry that students might not see or hear about otherwise.
- Assemble and give an academic presentation. Skills include deciding the key points the audience should learn, as well as researching material, integrating, and editing material into the time allotted.
- Receive feedback from colleagues and faculty

Steps

Choose a psychiatry-related topic. Check with the CD or ACD if you are unsure.
You can change topics later if you decide.
Research. Do a literature search and read. Focus the topic according to the
breadth of literature that exists. Discuss with appropriate faculty, if needed.
Assemble a 20-minute presentation (18 – 22 mins). Choose 3 – 5 main points &
edit what material to emphasize. Include why you are interested in that topic.
$\textbf{Creativity is encouraged.} \ \textbf{Creativity can hold the audience's attention and is likely}$
to teach your main points more effectively.
List your references. Minimum: 5 sources. More will get you more points. Email
these references to the Clerkship Director via email.

Ways to Make your Presentation Stand Out

- ★ Case vignette to illustrate the material
- ★ Video clips
- ★ Visual graphics, graphs, tables, websites
- ★ Alternate formats: a mock trial, role play, game show
- ★ Using testimonials from actual people or patients
- ★ Ask a question that is answered by the end
- ★ Ask the audience to answer trivia or multiple-choice questions
- ★ Survey audience responses
- ★ Use of QR codes
- **★** A demonstration
- ★ Dramatic reading
- **★** Props
